What's your favorite color?

This is the question on which the PTC Board is asking the membership to share their thoughts. As we complete the construction of the new front courts, we will need to paint them. We have several options to choose from. A number of members have expressed a desire to see the courts painted US Open Blue on US Open Green, while others favor Florida Dark Green on Light Green, or we can keep them their current color.



To help make this decision, our tennis court contractor has painted samples of the above two colors on our frontcourts. The Board is requesting that over the next 10 days those interested in expressing a preference stop by the club, view the samples and fill out a comment card that will be available in the clubroom. The colors in the pictures above while close do not truly represent the real colors.



Color Options are:

- A. Keep the courts their current color
- B. US Open Blue (interior), US Open Green (outside)
- C. Dark Florida Green (interior), Light Florida Green (outside)
- D. No particular preference

Much has been written about which color may be the "best" to play on. Major tournaments are using blue on green, as it is believed to highlight the ball the best for TV. The dark green will do a good job too in highlighting balls and some see the green on green to be a more traditional color combination. For most, any of the three-color combinations would be acceptable.

While stopping by the club is the best way to see the colors and to express your preference, you can also email your preference to our Club Manager (bill.jepsen@ptctennis.com). The Board will review all the comment cards and emails submitted to help them make the final decision.

Dark Green on Green

1. Dark Green on Green is the classic color combination for tennis courts at traditional, premier tennis clubs like the Peninsula Tennis Club. The modern standard Blue/Green that you are hearing about now is a trend that could change again anytime the tennis tours wish. Peninsula Tennis Club should set the Gold Standard which is and always will be Dark Green on Green tennis courts.

2. Dark Green on Green highlights the optic yellow tennis balls that we use today and maintains the traditional, elegant, and classic look that we should uphold for our club members young and old for years to come.

3. Dark Green on Green would compliment our club buildings and surrounding areas much better than any other color combinations. Our facility is being modernized but should still reflect the classic and traditional feel that we are proud to offer our members and visitors.

4. Peninsula Tennis Club should set the standard and not follow the trend.

US Open Blue on US Open Green

1. As tennis is played with yellow balls, and since blue paint has no yellow in it as green paint does, yellow balls are easier to see coming off a blue surface than a green one.

2. Having a better color contrast between the playing surface and balls is more essential at the PTC due to the placement of our courts and the need to reduce sun glare.

3. The US Open blue and green colors are becoming the modern "Classic Colors" for tennis hard courts now that the US Open, the US Open Series of tournaments before the US Open, the Athens and Beijing summer Olympic Games and many Division 1universities have adopted them for their tennis courts.

4. Aesthetically speaking the green/green and blue/green court colors are quite comparable, soothing and calm. The nod thus should go to choosing the blue/green court colors because the color blue provides better optical advantages over green on the playing surface.

Please read the CIP update for more information on the many developments taking place during the past month. The Club is on track to fully re-open in May and there is a list of planned activities planed over the next several months so everyone can enjoy our new surroundings.

March has been our busiest month for outdoor work since initial demolition back in September. A variety of contractors have been on site finishing the installation of drain lines, compacting the soil, starting work on a new gas line and most notably pouring lots and lots of concrete.

We are almost complete with the pouring of the concrete decks and walkways. Only the area around the Chatham entrance needs to be completed and this will happen in late April. Our tennis court contractor is fully engaged and has erected almost all the new fence posts. Over the next two weeks they will be completing the new curb that is going around the courts and preparing the courts for new asphalt. The actual laying of the new asphalt is planned to take place on or about April 14th. This will be followed closely by erecting the new fence



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fabric and then around the 28th, the courts will undergo final finishing and coloring. If all goes as hoped, the front courts will be back in service the week of May 12th.

In the south wing we are now in the process of painting and installing fixtures. The locker rooms should be fully completed by the end of April. We also expect the new Junior and exercise rooms to be ready for use in May. We are still working and waiting on PG&E to provide us with the new gas service we need. This ongoing delay is preventing us from re-establishing hot water service to the club. The last activity to take place will be repainting the exterior of the buildings.

Tennis Rule – A player cannot make contact with the ball if it has not reached their side of the court. The only time a player can reach over the net (without touching the net) is if the ball has so much backspin on it that it bounces on their side first then spins back over the net. The player can then reach over the net and tap it back into the net for an un-returnable winner. I have personally experienced this a few times and was ready and sure when it happened. Just be ready to explain this rule when it happens to you.

STAR PROGRAM

This is for Beginner, Novice, and Intermediate level Juniors. Coaches will use fun, modern games to help Juniors improve. Our emphasis is for Juniors to improve their rallying and play skills in this group training program. Juniors will train and play together and enjoy the group format.

A Heritage Perspective - 75 Years This Month: John Schroeder

The next time you turn on American Classic Movies and see "A Bridge Too Far," or "The Longest Day" playing, close your eyes and try to replace the pilot of the lead planes that towed the gliders over France & Germany with our very own **John Schroeder**. One of the nicest guys at the club, John flew for two years in the European Theatre. He was a 2nd Lieutenant with the Army Air Force. As the war ended, John flew C-47 cargo planes and picked up U.S., English & Canadian POW's in Germany.

After the war, John moved back to Burlingame, where he had been rent-

ing prior to going into the service. He met the love of his life at Burlingame High School. Though he was four years older than Alice, it was still love at first sight. Once married, they lived in Burlingame, San Mateo, and San Carlos before settling on John's current home, four houses down from the club. John and Alice were happily married for 63 years before Alice's passing four years ago. Together, they raised three wonderful kids.

John joined the PTC in 1946 and has seen and done it all. John served as President twice and has been on the Board many times. He has chaired all of the Board committees as well as volunteering on them. He remembers his biggest expenditure as President, having to get approval from membership (because it was over \$10,000) to install all new tennis fences. Stuart has just a bit bigger budget to work with as the new fence posts go up this week. That was a very big deal back then though John says.

Speaking of his participation, John has been involved with many of the tournaments that used be held at the club. He also donated a lot of time to outside tournaments as well. He was sorry to see the National Junior Championship tournaments end during his last tenure as President. The National Junior Championship was relocated back East. John even remembers a tournament he worked on had local crooner Bing Crosby actually attending and presenting the championship trophies to the winners.

John has competed in many tournaments both in California and Nevada. He once told his wife that he would stop going to play in the Tournaments in Nevada that he and other club members routinely played in the year he didn't bring home a trophy. Twenty years later, he was still going and bringing home the championship trophies. (Personally, I would have been buying engraved trophies at the trophy store if I could get my wife to believe that!) He continued to play in his later years, winning many senior events. John remembers playing in the Merv Griffin Senior Tournament at the Peninsula Golf & Country Club and winning the Mixed Doubles Championship. When asked about his trophy, he said that they actually won a new can of balls. John said that times were tough back then. His fondest tournament memory was when the PTC senior team made it to Arizona for the Nationals in 1990 (check out the photo behind the bar in the clubhouse of that outstanding team). A very young *Gordon Nagare* is the only member of that team still at the club.

"Schroed", as some members of the club used to call him, has many memories over the past 62 years. John misses playing tennis with all of the wonderful families and having great BBQ's at the club. It was quite social in the older days, yet there was always high caliber tennis going on. Some of the young players he's seen at the club include Stan Smith, Jimmy Conners, Michael Chang, Pete Sampras, John McEnroe and a youthful *Erik van Dillen*.

John looks at all of the work being done at the club today and remembers how there used to be large shrubs lining the backside of front courts. Members actually parked behind those courts, as the pools had not been installed yet. He can hardly wait to see the newest makeover of the club.

Today, John is nearing his 90th birthday (December) and has gone through two knee replacements. He says that his tennis days may be over, but his love for the club is still strong. I know that I can speak for the PTC in saying that our admiration towards you John will always be just as strong.
